# Walking Breaks

## The Bog of Frogs Loop

Howth Head, a peninsula 15km northeast of Dublin City, has been immortalised in James Joyce's Ulysses. Howth is a bustling village that offers visitors a myriad of attractions including Lambay Island, Ireland's Eye, Howth Castle, The National Transport Museum, the Martello Tower and the Baily Lighthouse. Wildlife enthusiasts will adore Ireland's Eye and its bird sanctuary which boasts guillemots, razor-bills, fulmars, gulls and gannets. This loop is the longest of four which start at the DART (train) Station in the heart of the village. You are taken along the harbour before climbing away from the village around the Nose of Howth and onto the clifftops. Take in the stunning views of Lambay Island and Ireland's Eye, and be overwhelmed by the heady scent of coconut from the bright yellow gorse on the heath. Pass the Baily Lighthouse on your left as you enter the second section of cliff paths. Leaving the coast after Red Rock, you climb to circle the Ben of Howth and return to Howth Village via the route of the old tramline.

### At a Glance

## The Bog of Frogs Loop

<b>Directions</b>	Howth village is situated 15km north-east of Dublin city centre. The trailhead is located at the start of the promenade beside the DART (Dublin Area Rapid Transport) Station in Howth Village. The village is also served by the No. 31 and 31B buses from the city centre.
<b>Ascent</b>	240m
<b>Distance</b>	10km
<b>Estimated Time</b>	2.5 to 3 hours
<b>Grade</b>	Hard
<b>Trailhead</b>	Howth Village, Co. Dublin
<b>Terrain</b>	Laneways, hill tracks and clifftop paths

B-C. Follow the cliff path for approximately 3km before the green, blue and red loops turn right and ascend to The Summit car park. You continue straight on here to reach the access road for the Bailey Lighthouse. Cross the road and join the second section of cliff path.

C-D. Continue to follow the cliff path for another 3km to pass safety handrails at Red Rock. Shortly afterwards, the loop swings right and uphill onto a grassy track. After 500m you cross the busy Carrickbrack Road and enter a hillside section.

D-E. The track takes you around the shoulder of Tibbradden Hill to enter a golf course. Cross the course carefully - using the line of white rocks as your line of travel. On the opposite side enter the Bog of Frogs area.

E-F. You now follow a track through the Bog of Frogs and onto open hilltop on the shoulder of the Ben of Howth where you pick up the red loop before descending through the grounds of the local GAA Club, and eventually reaching the Balkill Park estate.

F-A. Entering Balkill Park, you pick up the green and blue loops as you join the tramline pathway. Follow the pathway downhill to exit directly opposite the DART Station - picking up the green, red and purple loops along the way.

# Walking Breaks, Using Loop Walks - Advice & Safety

## Choose your walk carefully

- When selecting and planning your walk, do take into consideration whether you and your walking companions want a leisurely walk or a more energetic walk and also your preferred walk duration. All the loop walks are graded as 'easy', 'moderate' or 'hard'.

## Planning your walk - a key to safety

- **Check the weather conditions:** Before setting out on ANY walk, check the weather forecast. If the forecast is not good, consider revising your plans. During your walk, watch for changes in the weather, if it deteriorates be prepared to return to the walk trailhead.

- **Walk in daylight, NEVER in darkness:** Check sunset times and always plan to finish your walk while there is still plenty of light. Make sure the walk is achievable in the time allowed (at least one hour for every 3 km) and make sure to allow for stops along the way.
- **Company:** It is always safer not to go walking on your own and to stay together.
- **Tell someone reliable of your plans:** Leave word of your walking route with someone reliable and do

remember to advise them on your return.

## Clothing and items to bring

The amount of clothing and other items you may require will depend on the amount of time you plan to walk for, the type of walk and the weather conditions. You should:

- Always bring a waterproof jacket and warm clothing and remember it can be windier and colder on more exposed walks and on high ground.
- Wear walking boots or trekking shoes suitable for use on rough ground. The most common walking injury is to the ankle or lower leg, usually resulting from a simple slip or fall. This is less likely to happen if you wear proper footwear with good ankle support and a rugged sole.
- Bring plenty of snack foods and liquid.
- Carry a well charged mobile phone. However, while a mobile phone may be useful in an emergency, it should not be relied on as a safety aid as network coverage is often poor in the hills and countryside.
- If you are on medication and could have a requirement for it during your walk, be sure to bring it with you.
- Always carry a map or guide of your intended route.

## Issues to consider while walking

- Use and mark your map to keep track of where you are and the progress you are making along the loop walk.
- National Loop Walks are waymarked, so are easy to

follow. However, if you think you are lost, don't panic. Check your map and try work out your position. If you feel you need to backtrack to get your bearings, do so. If still lost, returning the route you have just walked is an option.
